

Fourth Sunday in Lent – Laetare Sunday



Nicodemus was a very influential member of the Sanhedrin and a prominent Pharisee, he was also a "seeker after the truth"; he had heard about Jesus and His teaching and he came secretly, at night, to speak to Him and to gain an understanding of His message. He was aware that there were many false messiahs, who appeared from time to time in Israel, and who vanished just as quickly but he also realised that Jesus was different from these others and so he took the great risk of contacting Jesus and arranging the meeting.

This was a pivotal event in the ministry of Christ, an opportunity to engage with a powerful figure in Judaism and to discuss His ministry with him. Jesus begins this passage with an important symbol from Israel's past, "the serpent in the desert". In today's first reading we hear of the sins and transgressions of the people as they turned away from God and the subsequent devastation of their nation and slavery in Babylon. This is just one example of how they broke their covenant with God, another occasion occurred in the Exodus from Egypt when again the Israelites grumbled to Moses about the Manna, the gift from God that saved them from starvation. God's punishment for this transgression was a plague of fiery serpents which was only relieved when Moses had made a bronze figure of a serpent on a stick which he raised in sight of the people and those afflicted were healed.

Jesus speaks of the "Son of Man" who is "lifted up", "so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him". He then speaks of the God "who loved the world so much that he gave his only son so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost". We cannot know the effect of this discussion on Nicodemus; we can only put ourselves in his place and wonder at this prophesy and how it touches us. Please read this passage slowly to yourself and try to absorb the message. It is one of great love, great sacrifice; a message that has touched the hearts of millions throughout the ages and it is written for you today. The sacrifice of Calvary is to come, the light of Christ shines through His church and in the hearts of all who follow Him. It will defeat the darkness of sin and we will be known as people "who live by the truth". The message he received brought Nicodemus to the foot of the cross and the body of Our Saviour into his hands, that same message is for us today. David Frank
